Q: What do hummingbirds eat?








A: Only in the Americas, which are in the Western Hemisphere.

Q: On average, how many flower blossoms might a hummingbird feed from each day?





A: Yes! And, you can put out nesting material and feeders to keep them coming back!

Q: Will hummingbirds that migrate return to the same feeding and nesting locations each year?









A: Yes. So, never remove a nest from a tree or bush, because it could be reused by the same or a different hummingbird.







Q: Will hummingbirds reuse the same nest?







A: No. Hummingbirds are not cavity nesters, so they will never nest in a bird house or roosting box.







Q: Will hummingbirds nest or roost in bird houses?







A: No. For example, there is a sub-species of Allen's hummingbirds in California that stay year-round.
