Commencement Address U.S. Senator Joseph R. Biden, Jr. (D - Del.)

SENATOR BIDEN TO ADDRESS LOYOLA LAW GRADUATES

Senator Joseph R. Biden, Jr. (D-Del.), senior Democrat on the Senate Foreign Relations Committee and a member and former chairman of the Judiciary Committee, will be the keynote speaker at Loyola Law School's Commencement Ceremonies on May 16. Biden also is the top Democrat on the European Affairs Subcommittee and cochair of the Senate NATO Observer Group.

Senator Biden has served in the United States Senate since January 1973 (term expires 2002), and is the second



youngest person in U.S. history elected to the Senate. A law graduate of Syracuse University, Biden has earned international recognition as a policy innovator, effective legislator and party spokesman on a wide range of domestic and foreign issues, from

international relations and arms control to crime prevention and drug control. Author of the Violent Crime Control and Law Enforcement Act (1994), he is now the senior Democrat on the Subcommittee on Youth Violence and co-chairs the Senate Caucus on International Narcotics Control. In 1998, Congressional Quarterly named Biden one of "Twelve Who Made A Difference" for playing a lead role in the Senate on foreign policy, including NATO enlargement and the successful passage of bills to streamline U.S. foreign affairs agencies.

Before we part, I wish for you to ask yourselves one question. Put aside the black letter law, the Socratic method, your class rank. Put aside the Bar exam, the hunt for employment, and where you want to be in ten years. Instead, think about what it is you stand for. Why are you here? What is the fuel that drove you through this trial day after day? In pursuit of what? Before we can progress, the question must be posed. Beyond the measure of a transcript, it is what lies within us that will propel us forward, enabling us to tackle greater endeavors during our careers -- from defending the liberty of an individual in a courtroom, to determining the fate of an entire nation on Capitol Hill. Ask yourself 'what do I stand for?'

Do not, however, become frustrated if the answer is not readily apparent. For some, there will be no immediate impulse. My suggestion is to persist. Continue to seek the answer. Be patient because what it is we are searching for is not out there somewhere waiting to be discovered like buried treasure. Not at all. What we are searching for in this lifetime is not to be found. It is to be made.

And ultimately, when you arrive at your final destination, be prepared to look back upon your journey and testify as to your own character. Charm is deceptive. Beauty is hollow, Honor is eternal. I pray we shall remain free enough in spirit and in conscience to then stand and be proud of every choice we made.

I think all of us graduating today can remember a simpler, gentler time just before we started Loyola Law School. Back then, words were just that -- words. 


